

hen Joanna and Simon
Meredith Hardy moved into
their new London home, they
knew it wouldn't be long before
they would have to leave again. In fact, just six
weeks later, they both moved out to stay with
friends and invited builders into their period
property for a top-to-bottom renovation.

'We were keen to get all the work done right from the start,' says Joanna. 'While the house certainly wasn't in dire condition, it was a little tired and out of date. We could have lived with the kitchen, but it really wasn't to our taste, and since we were doing the rest of the house, it seemed silly not to update the most important room. Plus Simon had promised me my dream kitchen.'

### PLANNING THE LAYOUT

As a keen cook, Joanna longed for a kitchen where she could move around freely and access things easily, and that was kitted out with the latest appliances. The couple's grown-up children are frequent visitors, so it was important that this part of the house, which had already benefited from a side-return extension, was a family space, too, with room for entertaining.

'I wanted a design that wouldn't date,' says Joanna, 'so, while it was tempting to

go for something modern, we decided that a timeless look would be better. I was also eager to make the best possible use of the layout, with as much storage space as possible, as this house is smaller than our previous home.'


It was while looking on the internet that Simon came across kitchen company Higham Furniture. The couple liked what they saw and decided to pay the owner, Tim Higham, a visit.

'As soon as we met Tim, we felt sure we'd be able to work together,' recalls Joanna. 'I had a clear idea of how I wanted things and when Tim came to our home and had a look at the kitchen, he came up with lots of other suggestions, including running the cabinetry along two walls, with a large island in the centre. As well as providing plenty of storage, I also wanted the hob sited on the island, so that I could cook and socialise at the same time.'

### **CHOOSING A STYLE**

When it came to deciding on cabinetry, Joanna and Simon went to visit Tim's workshop in Hampshire and browsed samples, before deciding on hand-painted Shaker-style units. 'I chose Highland Falls 6 by Dulux as the colour for most of the furniture – its freshness appealed to us,' says Joanna.

To match the cabinetry, Tim recommended the couple visit Sabre Stone, which specialises ▶

in granite worktops. 'There are flashes of blue set in the black granite we chose that sit really well with the colour of the units,' says Joanna. 'Then we had a glass splashback painted in deep blue to tie it all together.'

### **SOURCING APPLIANCES**

Keen to ensure she had the correct cooking equipment, Joanna decided to cover all bases by opting for a steam oven, two single ovens and a combination microwave, all by Siemens.

'Tim designed a bank to house the ovens in one place for ease of use,' says Joanna, 'and I asked for them to be slightly offset for a quirky touch, with a larder cupboard either side. Although I hadn't had one before, I went for an induction hob. It may have taken a little bit of getting used to, but I wouldn't be without it now. Plus it was a great excuse to get a new Le Creuset set, as the hob requires ferrous metal-based saucepans, such as copper, steel or cast-iron, to operate.'

The Hardys sourced all of the appliances themselves. 'Simon is really good at these

things and has a great eye for detail,' says Joanna. 'He obtained quotes from various companies and we bought everything online through Bemco, rather than having to traipse around endless showrooms. We saved quite a bit of time and money that way."

Simon was also adamant that they have a high-quality extractor fan this time. 'He's always thought the standard models are pretty feeble,' says Joanna. 'So he put our builders in touch with WS Westin and together they came up with a really effective design.'

### **ENJOYING THE RESULTS**

The kitchen installation took around two weeks, with everything arriving on time and Tim ensuring that the process went smoothly. 'We're really happy with our new kitchen,' says Joanna. 'Although it's smaller than the one in our previous home, it's surprising how much we've incorporated into it, without making it feel cluttered. We spend most of our time in here – it's perfect for cooking in and is a sociable space that's simply a joy to be in.'
